Course Description/Prerequisites:

Acts is a course designed to study Apostolic Christianity as it is related through Luke’s documentation. The course will consider the historical, doctrinal, and devotional aspects of the book with any emphasis on particular contemporary topics.

MBU Institutional Outcomes supported by this course:

1. Communication Skills: Students will demonstrate competence in written, oral, and aesthetic communication.
2. Critical Thinking: Students will apply a framework for logical decision-making in various contexts.
3. Biblical Knowledge: Students will acquire skills related to biblical study methods, interpretation, and doctrine.
4. Biblical World View: students will articulate a world view that will tie all fields of study to the Scriptures “to the praise of His glory.”

Course Goals:

By the end of the class, I desire the student to:

1. To instill in students a desire to glorify God through the application of Biblical teaching.
2. To encourage students to know Christ better through a better understanding of the records of the early church.
3. To accurately apply the teaching of Acts to present day Christianity.
4. To stress that the ultimate aim of Bible study is NOT an informed intellect but a transformed person who lives the greatest commandment to "Love the Lord our God with all of our heart."

Course Objectives:

By the end of this class the student should be able to:

1. Demonstrate a basic understanding of the content of the book of Acts.
2. Demonstrate a basic understanding of missions in the OT as compared to the NT.
3. Demonstrate a basic understanding regarding the role of the Holy Spirit and the NT church.
4. Evaluate the charismatic movement’s teaching on tongues.
5. Gain a biblical view of communicating the gospel in various contemporary contexts.
6. Gain an understanding of how to resolve conflicts concerning biblical issues.
7. Biblically evaluate how to make decisions in life.

Course Requirements

1. Acts Reading:
 - a. You will need to read through Acts 3 times in this course.
 - One reading must be done in **one sitting**.
 - b. **BONUS**: If you read through *Luke and Acts* in one sitting, I will add 1% to your overall course grade. Please indicate you completed the bonus by leaving a comment in the coursework.

2. Devotionals: Each student will sign up to do **two** short devotionals (aprox. 250 words) according to the Devotional Template in the course documents. The devotional will cover a single truth and application in the selected chapter of Acts, and are due at class time, on their due date. Please bring a paper copy to give to the professor and be ready to read your devotional to the class.

3. Textbook Quizzes: Be prepared for quizzes from your reading in the Constable commentary. Study guides are provided in our handouts section. Quizzes will be taken online **with no helps** and are due @ 11:55 PM according to the course calendar and have a six-minute time limit.

4. Tests/Final Exam: There will be five tests and the final exam. Tests will be primarily from course lectures/notes and the reading in *Constable's* text. The final exam is cumulative. Tests are administered through MyMaranatha and are noted on the Class Schedule.

5. Main Themes Assignments: Take a theme (Holy Spirit, Missions, Church) and trace how it is developed throughout the book.
 - a. I would suggest reading through the book with the theme in mind. You should take notes on the theme and write your paper after you have fully read through the book.
 - b. I am looking for a lot of interaction with the text. That does not mean a lot of quoting, but I am looking for you to use references to back up your points.
 - c. Paper should be 800-1200 words and follow the research paper format in the course documents (no title page).
 - d. Each paper should include at least three quality resources.

6. Grad Project: Chose a sermon in Acts by Peter, Stephen, or Paul and write a 10-14 page expositional paper (exegesis + application). Examine the occasion, recipients, use of the OT, theology, and draw applications to how the sermon should influence our preaching/teaching today. Include a bibliography with at least 8 quality sources. Please follow the research paper format in the course documents and the style guide for CBCM/MBS papers (Turabian).

Nature of the Course:

This course will be prepared along the Lecture Model. As such, the majority of the testing material will come from the lectures. The textbook should be seen as a tool whereby the students become acquainted with the material that will be covered in the lecture. Having already learned some of the foundational truths, the student will be able to build off that knowledge during the lecture times. Seen in this way, both the lectures and the text reading are integral to a robust learning experience.

Late Work/Attendance:

- Plan ahead, pace yourself, do not do work at the last minute. Extensions will rarely be granted for students to failed to prioritize assignments in their schedule.
- Late Work Penalties: 5% is deducted per day. The penalty will not go beyond 50%.
- Late Test Penalty: Any student that has an unexcused absence on the day of a test will automatically receive a deduction of 10% on that test grade.
- The school's attendance policy will be enforced. Students are will be tardy if they are not seated when the professor calls the class to order. Also, students who leave class early without an explanation will be marked tardy (or absent if there is 15 minutes or more remaining in the period).

Academic Dishonesty:

Academic dishonesty is a serious offense, and it can exist in many forms. For example, the following would be considered a sample of academically dishonest activities that might occur in this class:

- Sharing advance information regarding the content or answers for a test or quiz.
- Receiving advance information regarding the content or answers for a test or quiz.
- Using a previous student's old tests or quizzes as a study guide for this semester's tests and quizzes.
- Handing in the same paper or substituting a similar paper in more than one class without permission.
- Plagiarism—representing the words or unique thoughts of another as your own.
 - Plagiarism extends not only to the actual words of the original author, but also to the thought patterns or organizational structure. Papers giving evidence of plagiarism will not be accepted. Papers written by other students may be consulted for help on the form and structure, but it is **not acceptable** to use content from other student papers (even if properly footnoted).
- Submitting as your own, materials that have been enhanced by another.
- Academic penalties for academic dishonesty range from an F grade on the particular evaluation to an F grade in the course. Also, a range of serious disciplinary penalties may apply.

Academic Success Center:

Collaboration:

Collaboration (cooperation of students with each other in preparation for a class) is a legitimate learning experience. However, teachers expect that a student will do his own work and not replace individual initiative with another's labor. For example:

- a. **It is acceptable** for a student who filled out his study guide, but was unable to find an answer or did not understand one of the questions to ask for help from another student. **It is not acceptable** for a student who failed to do his study guide to use his neighbor's study guide to cram for the quiz;
- b. **It is acceptable** for a group of students, after doing their own initial work, to compare answers and to quiz each other over the test or quiz study questions. **It is not acceptable** for a student who has done little or no personal preparation to join such a study group;
- c. **It is acceptable** for a student who was absent from class to obtain notes from another student for the day he was absent. **It is not acceptable** for a student who did not feel like taking notes, or who was working on other class work, to obtain notes from another student. **It is also unacceptable** for a student to use notes or study guides from a prior semester;
- d. **It is acceptable** to use another student's paper for help on the form and structure, but **it is not acceptable** to use content from that paper for his own paper.

ADA:
